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Global Expedition Update

Having descended from High Camp on Denali (click here to read the report) on 2 June, we flew back to Talkeetna in gorgeous sunshine to enjoy a much-needed beer, good food and green trees!

On 5 June, I bid farewell to my fellow



climbers and headed north to Denali National Park, stopping to give one of the guides, Joey, a ride. Heading east along the Denali Highway gave me a chance to write

in the vast, remote Alaskan wilderness before a spectacular ride over the Top of the World Highway back into Canada. On route, you pass through the infamous gold-rush town of Chicken before finally dropping down out of the mountains into Dawson City.

Planning to stop only 1 night, I stayed in Dawson for 3, enjoying the friendly local hospitality in the land of the midnight sun. From can-can dancing and gambling at Gertie's casino and all-night parties to relaxed lunches with Heidi on the patio of Klondike Kate's, it was great. Heidi's place, the White Ram, also gets June's top tip! Two other recommendations include Bombay Peggy's, formally the town brothel, now an intriguing hotel; and the Pit, where we got into some real "honky-tonk" live music!

Further south along the Klondike Highway, I was given an informative tour of the Yukon Wildlife Centre by the welcoming staff before heading in to Whitehorse to meet some friends and give an interview with CBC Radio. On one evening, I gave a lift to two of the local reporters, Chris and Julianne,



who were covering the election, when we bumped into the self-styled "Whitehorse Chicks". Then to a local football match before a night on the town.

About 100km south of Whitehorse, you reach Skagway just over the border into the USA, and the start of an amazing ferry trip through the Panhandle in SE Alaska. On route, you pass the exquisitely coloured and

aptly named Emerald Lake and the world's "smallest desert"!

The first port of call for the ferry was Juneau, Alaska's water-bound capital, which you can only reach by boat or by plane. The afternoon boat trip to watch the humpback



whales, sea lions and bald eagles was a particular treat; and I was intrigued at the sheer size of some of the cruise liners docked alongside the harbour.

Continuing south to Ketchikan, I stopped for a few days to explore the beautiful coastline with Tami, who was originally from the area, but now living in Iowa. In a region that receives on average only 70 days of sunshine a year, we were blessed with beautiful sunshine throughout and temperatures in excess of 80F.

With a plan to meet up with Tami again later in Montana, I boarded the ferry for the last leg of the marine highway to Prince Rupert and the Canadian border.

I made fairly rapid progress towards Calgary as I had a few problems to fix, including a broken computer and auxillary heater. Along the way, though, I pulled over to see a wildfire burning high up on the hillside near a town called Terrace. This year in BC has seen a record-breaking 430+ fires in the Province before the end of June. You know a big fire when the radio presenter talks about it in square kilometres, not just hectares! With the skies hazy due to the smoke from the fires, I was excited to see my first black bear as I was trying not to get lost on the remote logging trails.



After an overcast drive through awesome Jasper and Banff National Parks, I reached Calgary. I camped just outside of town next to the winter olympic

stadium and was most impressed when the Dell technician managed to replace the entire motherboard of my laptop on the camp table under the Land Rover awning.

With the vehicle gleaming after a service

in Calgary, I headed back west into BC to Golden, home of the Kicking Horse River and some excellent white water rafting with the guys from "Wet 'n' Wild"!

As Dianne, one of the paraglider pilots I met there said, there was a danger the



global expedition could become the Golden expedition, as I was hooked. It's a fabulous place for the adventure sports fan in both summer and winter. Thanks to Scott, who runs

Altitude Adventures, I discovered Mount 7, an excellent paragliding launch site. After a tandem flight with Scott, as I hadn't flown for a couple of years, I was stoked when I landed after an exhilirating solo flight, looking down on the clouds and valley. Not bad on a hangover after a fun campfire party the night before with the rafting crowd from Red Deer, Alberta!

After an awesome sunrise from Mount Seven, I met up with Jubilee, who looks after Boo, the 2-year old Grizzly bear who lives in a 22-acre refuge up on the side of the Golden ski hill, where I was able to get some great footage. With wildlife on the mind, I stopped in at the local wolf centre, run by Casey & Shelley. Expecting to just see them behind a fence, I was delighted to be able to go for a walk with two of the gray wolves and Casey. Probably one of the few places in the world where you can have a chance to do that.

Feeling very chuffed with my day's experience, I drove the short distance to Revelstoke and a pleasant campsite by the lake and a chance to sort out some kit. My



final day of June was spent touring west through BC in some fabulous mountain country. As the sun was getting low and the hills were aglow in a serene evening light, I passed

through Lillooet, stopping to witness one of the larger forest fires in the region. With the sun dancing off the smoke from the fire, it was a scary sight. No wonder that the local population were on evacuation alert.

With thoughts about the following day's fun to be enjoyed in Vancouver on Canada Day, I made camp in the mountains just East of Whistler, home to the now world-famous ski resort. I would also have completed an entire east to west traverse of Canada...

Back in Canada, the news is dominated by the federal election, with a minority Liberal government being elected on 29 June headed by Paul Martin. The other big story was the record-breaking number of forest fires in British Columbia, with in excess of 430 separate fires burning in the Province by the end of the June.
